***Developing a Best Management Practices Program for Your Nursery***

A 2.5 hour workshop on preventive practices and systems approaches to avoid introduction of *P. ramorum* to nurseries and spread of the disease to customers

The California Department of Food and Agriculture has teamed up with the California Association of Nurseries and Garden Centers to facilitate the development of a voluntary program for California nurseries and train nursery staff.

Across the country there is an increased focus on “clean stock programs.” Some states are pressuring the USDA to develop mandatory Best Management Practices (BMP) programs for nurseries and work groups are meeting under the guidance of U.S. Department of Agriculture/Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (USDA/APHIS) to develop such a program for *Phytophthora ramorum*.

It is important for California nurseries to take a lead role by developing a customized, easy-to-implement, voluntary BMP program. Each program is designed with the help of growers and documents the steps the nursery agrees to take to insure the production of clean, healthy nursery stock free of *P. ramorum* and other diseases.

This workshop is designed to introduce the topic to nursery owners and staff, and helps guide them to develop their own, individualized BMP manual for preventing the entry and spread of *P. ramorum*.

Participants should bring their copy of “Nursery Industry Best Management Practices for *Phytophthora ramorum*” to the workshop, and a limited supply of extra manuals will be available for those who do not already have a copy. Following a presentation on the program and its benefits to nurseries, attendees will be guided through the steps necessary to develop their own, individualized program and establish methods of documentation of their nursery practices.

There is no cost for the workshop, which is funded through the California Association of Nurseries and Garden Centers by a USDA/FAS TASC grant.
